STEVEN SAYS: BE THE CHURCH

On the last Sunday before Christmas I saw children being the church—not *going* to church, but *being* the church. What is the church? It is the community of God sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ. On that Sunday forty-some carolers (many of whom were children) climbed onto a school bus and went to several homes in the area singing Christmas carols and sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ. They brought hope and peace, comfort and joy to many people. And in so doing—they *were* the church. Ironically, the way they did it was by *leaving* the church grounds to find people with whom to share the Good News.

This month I'd like to share with you a "secret" that God can use to unleash the church to *be* the church. That "secret" is something called *spiritual gifts*. There is much misunderstanding today about what spiritual gifts are, what they are *not*, who has them, and how God intends them to be used by his people. One thing I can tell you now is that if you are a Christian and if you have been baptized, God has already given you a spiritual gift—and maybe more than one—and God expects you to be using it to edify or "build up" the church.

Do you already know what your spiritual gift is? Are you using it to build up the Body of Christ? If you are—you know the joy that comes with using your gift. If you are not, but would like to, please make a point of hearing the sermon series on January 17, 24, and 31. This teaching will revolutionize your spiritual life!

And if you're 13 or older and not participating in a Sunday School class right now, this could be a great time to make a New Year's resolution to check out what you've been missing. In fact, some of the teachers plan to do some deeper study of spiritual gifts so that each student will be able to identify, develop, and exercise his or her God-given gift.

January brings a new beginning to St. Paul's. It's the start of a new church year in terms of worship, new consistory leadership, and a new church budget. I am looking forward to serving as your consistory president for 2010. You have put your faith and trust in me to lead, and I do not plan to let you down.

For those of you who do not know me, my name is Barry Kulakowsky and I was elected at the November congregational meeting to be your next consistory president beginning January 1, 2010. My wife Barbara and I have been members of St. Paul's since 1976, and I have served the church in many capacities. Over the years I have served on the consistory as a deacon, elder, and various committee chairs as well as the chairperson for both the 250th Anniversary and Search Committees. I currently teach the Adult 2 Sunday school class on Sunday mornings.

One of my goals for this year is that I would like to see all our members really become involved in the life at St. Paul's. In November, the budget for 2010 was passed with a small increase in spending. However, this past year, giving has been down dramatically. We are all aware of the present state of the economy, but we must also remember, we would have nothing if it were not for the generosity of our Heavenly Father. Please keep that fact in mind when you are asked to step up and give of your time, talent, and financial support to St. Paul's.

A MISSIONS COMMITTEE PROJECT

Shelley Hickey, a member of St. Paul's, will be taking three of her Eastern University Senior Nursing students to El Salvador on a medical mission trip. The group will leave on February 27 and return on March 6, 2010. She and the students will have the opportunity to provide care in the hospital and several clinics in and around San Salvador.

They will travel with Project FIAT International and The Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. They will provide nursing care for patients, present health education programs, help construct buildings and assist children in the orphanage. This trip will provide a wonderful opportunity to serve the Lord in a different culture and to develop long-term international relationships and establish sustainable projects.

Shelley is asking our help to collect educational supplies for the children they will meet on their trip. The missions committee will place collection bins in the library and at narthex entrance of St. Paul's for the collection of the following items:

- Pencils, colored pencils and pens
- Water color paints and brushes
- White and colored paper
- Washable (NOT PERMANENT) markers, thick and thin
- Scotch tape and glue sticks
- Card games, puzzles, Lego's and other games
(These may be gently used items.)
- Different size balls, i.e. soccer balls, beach balls, rubber balls
- Arts and crafts items: string, scissors with blunt tips, beads, tissue paper, Popsicle sticks, fun foam etc.
- PRIZES for children to encourage cooperation—
not competition: bubbles, jump ropes, jacks, marbles, etc.

GENERAL FUND VERSUS CAPITAL FUND: WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?

Members have asked, "I want my giving to go toward the FLMC mortgage. Which fund should I give to?" The answer is the General Fund.

The General Fund is the fund from which the church's operating expenses are paid. Some examples of expenses paid from this fund are the FLMC mortgage, employee wages/salaries, and utility bills. The General Fund receives most of its revenue from envelope and plate giving and proceeds from the Peach Festival.

The Capital Fund is a special reserve fund used to purchase fixed assets (furniture, equipment, etc.) or to pay for repairs or maintenance that have a shelf life of more than one year (e.g., electrical or heating/cooling system upgrades). The Capital Fund receives most of its revenue from envelope giving and the Fall and Spring Turkey Dinners.

JANUARY SERMON SERIES

■ **Sunday, January 3** *Second Sunday after Christmas/
Communion Sunday/Commissioning officers*

Texts: Psalm 147, Ephesians 1:3-14, John 1:(1-9), 10-18

Sermon: **Dwelling Among Us**

The heart of the Christmas story is summarized by John in his Gospel: “The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us” (John 1:14). As we share in the Lord’s Supper, we realize this profound truth even more deeply.

■ **Sunday, January 10** *The Baptism of Christ*

Texts: Isaiah 43:1-7, Acts 8:14-17, Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

Sermon: **Receiving the Holy Spirit**

On the first Sunday after Epiphany we remember Christ’s baptism when the Holy Spirit descended like a dove. We also reflect on the role of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

■ **Sunday, January 17** *Second Sunday after Epiphany/Baptism*

Texts: Psalm 36:5-10, I Corinthians 12:1-10, John 2:1-11

Sermon: **About Spiritual Gifts**

Building on last week’s emphasis on the Holy Spirit, this week we’ll explore the topic of spiritual gifts. Every baptized believer has at least one. Do you know what *your* spiritual gift is?

■ **Sunday, January 24** *Third Sunday after Epiphany*

Texts: Psalm 19, I Corinthians 12:11-31, Luke 4:14-21

Sermon: **One Body**

The Corinthian passage continues, emphasizing that though we are differently gifted, we are all part of one body in Christ. Our spiritual gifts are given to us so that we can “build up” the body.

■ **Sunday, January 31** *Fourth Sunday after Epiphany*

Texts: Psalm 71:1-6, I Corinthians 13:1-13, Luke 4:21-30

Sermon: **The Greatest of These**

Usually the discussion of love in First Corinthians chapter 13 is heard through the “lens” of a wedding, but today we’ll look at it in its original context—following Paul’s discussion of spiritual gifts and his discussion of being one, though many. How do we make love work in *that* context?

ST. PAUL'S INCLEMENT WEATHER POLICY

Should there be inclement weather on a Sunday morning, please check the church web site www.stpaulsuccamity.org or phone the church office 610.689.9364 to see if Sunday school and/or church are canceled. We will post a bulletin on the web site and/or a message on the office phone. The decision will be made by 7:30am at the latest. Please do not look for announcements on local television stations or listen to local radio stations.

In general, Pastor Steven feels that if he can walk, crawl, or tunnel his way to the church building and anyone else makes the effort to come (by snowshoe, snowmobile, or skates), there will be worship. Regardless of whether we have acolytes, greeters, or musicians, when there are two or three gathered in Jesus' Name, God is in our midst (Matthew 18:20, paraphrased).

On the other hand, if travel is unsafe, it is NOT fair to require Sunday School teachers to risk their lives to teach a class, so it is quite possible that in some circumstances Sunday School may be cancelled while corporate worship is not. In those circumstances, those who usually worship at the early service may find a larger assembly of the faithful at 10:30 than at 8:00. On Sunday, December 20, for example, there were about 18 at the early service and closer to 100 at 10:30.
